Dear Friends and Family at St. John's,

A ministry of 10 years that saw so much change is impossible to convey in one letter, but we are all grateful for her time here. I am most grateful for Rev. Addie's love of God, the Church of Christ and the people of St. John's.

Right now is a time to feel our feelings rather than to ignore or even fear them. We acknowledge our fears about the future, but do not give in to them. Instead, let us recognize that God does not send fear into the hearts of God's people. When we receive messages of fear and hopelessness they are generally from what I like to call: "the other spirit." Sure, at times we can see some truth in a message of doom, but ironically it is sometimes harder for us to see the promise that is near or even just around the corner.

We will always have challenges in our future, for nothing will change unless we actively invite that change and work within and among us to realize the change that is God's future. St. John's is about to embark on a future with a Settled Lead Pastor that will provide the opportunity to work towards a shared vision of divine servanthood.

For now, I encourage you to think about the ways in which God and St. John's have been a positive support to you in the past. The promises that God has fulfilled in the past are our best guide to a hopefulness about our future – a future that is unknown and unknowable, but already held in God's hand before we can "see" it. I cherish the opportunity to walk together with you as your "new" Lead Bridge Pastor as we journey towards St. John's future – a future of promise and joy!

Beloved members and friends of St. John's,

I want to take time to share with you my deepest and most heartfelt thanks for the celebration on my final Sunday. Your kind words, your incredibly generous gifts, your gestures of love, and most especially, your hugs, filled me with warmth, gratitude, and joy. A special thank you to all who took time to plan and provide an absolutely delightful luncheon and who hosted my family and I with such care. I am stepping away with a heart overflowing.

As we move forward, our paths diverging, I want to lovingly communicate with you some important boundaries that I am responsible for establishing per The Ordained Minister's Code of Ethics. Once our goodbyes are said, I will need to intentionally separate myself for period of one year. This means that I will not be available to perform pastoral services for you or provide you spiritual support in person, by email, phone, text, or social media. It will not be possible for me to attend church events, worship, or social gatherings. Of course, if we bump into one another at the grocery store or, more likely, the coffee shop, I will greet you with joy (and a hug), but I will not intentionally seek out time with you and I trust that, if we do see each other, we will refrain from discussing church-related matters. If, after time has passed, you would like to re-connect, you are welcome to reach out, aware that, of course, our relationship will be different moving forward.

I know that all of this sounds intense and rather harsh or abrupt, particularly because of the close bond we have shared for so many years. I feel it, too. It's one of the most challenging parts of our call as Pastors. That said, I fully trust that I have been asked to hold these boundaries with very good reason. This "letting go" will make it possible for you to have hearts and arms open wide, ready to welcome new leadership and establish a deep connection of trust with them. Personally speaking, this distance will create space to grieve, rest, reflect, and give thanks for each of you and all that we have lived and learned together. It also gives me the freedom to jump into the new call that God has placed on my life and be fully present in my new work environment.

My integrity, my fitness for ministry, and the covenant I share with my colleagues are all deeply important to me, so I ask that you help me honor them by holding these boundaries with me, difficult as that may be for both of us.

I will end by sharing what I have shared with you before: even with physical distance between us, you are never far from my heart and my prayers. May God bless you and keep you, my dear ones, and thank you for everything.

Notes From Church Council



Financial Report: Matt Carson, Financial Chair

September 2024 Financial Summary:

1. Income vs. Budget:

- September income was \$40,691.75. Of this total, \$25,596.32 came from tithes and offerings, falling short of the \$26,443 budgeted goal by \$846.68.

2. Expenses:

- August expenses were \$49,626.32, which is \$3,166.58 less than the budgeted amount of \$52,793.

3. Overall Impact:

- Although expenses were below budget, September continues the trend of less than expected tithes and offerings.

Year-to-Date Financial Summary:

1. Income:

- Total year-to-date income is \$443,788.11, creating a shortfall of \$16,168.26.

2. Expenses:

- Total year-to-date expenses are \$477,803.66, which is \$10,305.32 over the budgeted amount of \$467,498.34.

3. Overall Financial Status:

- The year-to-date deficit is \$38,018; the projected deficit was \$15,632.

Hire Senior Pastor: Search and Call Process (Susan Fitzpatrick)

The committee has reached a decision on a final candidate for senior pastor who has verbally accepted the position.

Assuming a positive outcome, the candidate will lead worship on Sunday, November 17, followed immediately by a short congregational meeting and vote. Again, assuming a positive outcome, the candidate's start date and installation is projected to be end of February or early March.

Facilities/Superintendent Position (Marge Jewell, Personnel), Daytime Coverage (Bob Bertollette, Trustees)

Personnel met and worked on the job description. Trustees were asked for their input. It was recommended that the Personnel Committee recruit additional people to be involved in hiring the Facilities Manager.

Communications: Update on Task Force (Mark Hogan/Grace Marchione)

The website project is underway with the *UCC Everywhere* tool. Work is continuing on clarifying internal communication pathways and establishing project priorities. There will be a brief presentation at a congregational meeting on Sunday, October 20.

A committee formed to review/interpret current and final approval issues.

Exterior Restoration Project (Bob Bertollette)

The two areas still needing restoration are the outside office wall (approximately \$70K) and the long wall at the playground (approximately \$170K). A fundraising campaign will begin for donations. Soup-sale proceeds on October 27 will go to the restoration. The age of the oldest building standing is being investigated for historic registry or to possibly help with grants.

Old Business:

WNL Update (Andrew Paulson/Mary Billy)

There have been (on average) 28 people attending the meal. Different food vendors have been tried.

FALL CLEANUP: DON'T!



Good news! The latest advice for fall garden cleanup is to leave our gardens alone until spring. Many different pollinators overwinter in the garden, so if you clean everything up, you destroy their habitat. Birds also feed on the seeds from plants in the garden. We should wait until the temperatures in the Spring consistently reach the 50s to clean up our gardens. It is also good practice to mulch the leaves in your lawn rather than bag them and put them into landfills. Leaves are nature's fertilizer, so just cut them into small pieces with your mower (unless, of course, you maintain a compost pile). It may not look as great as cleaning everything up in the fall, but it sure does save a lot of work and is healthier for the environment.

Oaxaca Learning Center Update from David Furniss

The Oaxaca Learning Center (TOLC) continues to thrive in its goal to provide underserved Oaxacan youth ages 14 to 24 with the skills, tools, and self-confidence to envision a new future and move beyond the limitations of poverty. In a holistic learning community, the students are provided with academic tutoring in math, physics, chemistry, and English, with personal support provided by the staff and tutors, many of whom have grown through the benefits of TOLC. The Mexican Government has identified it as one of the best youth programs in Mexico. Since its founding in 2005, TOLC has served 3831 students and provided 81,644 tutoring hours. Academic success on entrance exams is 83%, far above the 37% Oaxaca state average.

Growth has created the need to expand the space at TOLC. Rather than continuing to rent outside auxiliary facilities, TOLC has undergone a project to expand the existing space to provide more classroom space and updated technology for learning and research. The construction is nearly complete and is full of promise for the future of TOLC.

I have continued to faithfully support TOLC, and I encourage you, the members of St. John's, to continue the support you have given over the years. Robert Anyon, President of the Friends of the Oaxaca Learning Center (501c3 organization in the United States), has expressed gratitude specifically for the financial support St. John's has given in the past. I encourage you to visit the TOLC web site to learn more about this institution that gives hope to so many young people in Oaxaca. tolc.org.mex.

**Creation Stewards Drought Report
...contemplating water while watering...**



As you have noticed, starting in June we have had one dry summer. Add in the heat and we had a recipe for disaster concerning our church gardens. **THANKS TO THE MANY WATERERS** who dedicate themselves to watering for a week or more during the growing season we averted the disaster. It was close though! There was watering to be done beyond the containers since we had many newly planted shrubs and trees for the June Garden Tour. Granted, we mustn't complain as we look at North Carolina and the problem of too much water! We all need to take a step back and think about how precious water is. It is the sustenance of all life on Earth for one thing. Below are just a few of the "100 Amazing Water Facts You Should Know" I found on the seametrics.com website.

- ⌘ Water is the most common substance found on Earth.
- ⌘ Water makes up about 71% of the Earth's surface.
- ⌘ 96.5% of the Earth's water is saltwater. Fresh water constitutes 3.5% in lakes, rivers, and glaciers.
- ⌘ There is an estimated 326 million trillion gallons of water on Earth.
- ⌘ If the entire world's water were to fit into a 4 liter jug the fresh water available for us would be equal to one tablespoon.
- ⌘ About 27 trillion gallons of groundwater are drawn for use in the US each year.
- ⌘ About one half of the population in the US uses groundwater.
- ⌘ It takes about 12 gallons of water per day to sustain a human (this figure takes into account all uses for water, such as drinking, sanitation, and food production).
- ⌘ 40% of freshwater withdrawals in the US are used for agriculture.
- ⌘ Over 42,000 gallons of water (enough to fill a 30'x50' swimming pool) are needed to grow and prepare food for a typical Thanksgiving dinner for eight.
- ⌘ 1 pound of beef requires 1799 gallons of water to produce.
- ⌘ 1 apple requires 18 gallons of water to produce.
- ⌘ 85% of the world's population lives in the driest half of the planet.
- ⌘ Unsafe water kills 200 children every hour.
- ⌘ In just one day 200 million workhours are consumed by women collecting water for their families.
- ⌘ 1/3 of what the world spends on bottled water in one year could pay for projects providing water to everyone in need.
- ⌘ The average family of four uses 180 gallons of water per day outdoors. It is estimated that over 50% is wasted by evaporation, wind, or overwatering.
- ⌘ Household leaks can waste more than 1 trillion gallons annually nationwide.
- ⌘ A leaky faucet dripping one drop per second can waste more than 3000 gallons a year.
- ⌘ If everyone in the US flushed the toilet just one less time per day, we could save a lake one mile long, one mile wide, and four feet deep.

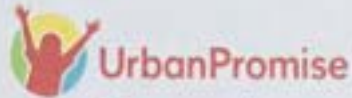
