In the midst of a dialogue sermon Rev. Sue and I preached on December 30th ~ a sermon focused on our hopes for the New Year ~ I said that one of my hopes for St. John's was for more "ands" and less "buts." Let me explain . . .

Have you ever noticed how much the meaning of a sentence changes when we use the word "and" rather than the word "but"? "But" is limiting and has the tendency to be negative...it has the power to bring down an idea by pointing out what is missing:

"...but we can't."

"...but that will never work."

"...but giving is down."

"...but there aren't enough young people."

"And," however..."and" is a word like HOPE...it is an invitation to see who and what we already have in our midst... A word that causes us to think of all the possibilities and opportunities that lie ahead of us.

Words matter, even the little ones, and we have a choice about the words that we use to talk about our church community. So instead of saying something like, "Church was so great today, but I wish more people were there." How about, "Church was great today, and I'm glad I saw people I love"... Instead of, "Church was great today, but it was all old people," what about, "Church was so great today and I noticed a few new faces and I introduced myself to a couple of young families." Or how about, "Church was great today, and I'm going to bring a friend next week." Or maybe, "Church was great today, and I hope more people get to experience what it means to be a part of us here at St. John's!"

I have been so aware of the significance of choosing the word "and" as our community continues to do our best to engage young families, youth, and children in ways that feel authentic to who we are as a faith community. I will confess there are plenty of times when I have been tempted to use the word "but" out of frustration, and because it's always tempting to focus our attention on who and what is missing and the opportunities that people are not grabbing hold of.

The opportunity that we have, however, is to change our "buts" to "ands," realize who is already among us, be proud of what we are already offering to young people, and see where we might do and offer something more or different. Because we are a true community that shares the costs and joys of discipleship with one another, we are all responsible for creating an environment and cultivating relationships with those we wish to see more of!

Okay so maybe you don't think you are called to be a Sunday School teacher or to volunteer with our youth or in the nursery or to serve on our Board of Educators...and then again, maybe you are! This "and" work is not just for people who are already working with our young people: this is work for all us, the people of St. John's, called to BE the church for all people! To what new "and" work is God calling you?

Were You There?

Thirty Years Ago: Evening Lenten Services were held in a "round robin" fashion. Other UCC churches participating were Pleasantville, Chalfont; Salem, Doylestown; and St. Luke's, Ottsville.

Twenty-five Years Ago: Two new support groups were organized: Second chances: A Support Group for separated and Divorced Persons, and Just for Men.

Twenty Years Ago: Excerpted from February 1999 *Enlightener*. Jewish and Christian parochial students were asked to write about the Bible. Some responses were as follows:

Lot's wife was a pillar of salt by day, but a ball of fire by night.

The Fifth Commandment is honor thy mother and father.

Fifteen Years Ago: The Executive Board of Church Women United met at Saint Stanislaus Parish Center.

Ten Years Ago: Youth activities included a trip to the Crayola factory in Easton and a Winter Fest at the Kaufmann's.

Five Years Ago: An open house was held in St. John's Library to highlight the changes and improvements that were made over the previous months.

One Year Ago: The Lenten Study focused on Jamie Blaine's *Midnight Jesus*, described as a book "where struggle, faith and grace collide."



What's Happening in Church Council?

Financial Reports: Sandy and Bob Taylor, Cotreasurers December was a good month financially for St. John's, especially when one considers that income received after December 25 was not included in December but rather will be considered January 2019 income. The ordinary income in the first four weeks in December (including the budgeted transfer from investments) was \$55,576.02, exceeding our December expenses of \$51,194.84 by \$4,381.18.

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Our 2018 yearend deficit was \$6,935, or 1.3% of our 2018 budget. Through November we had a year-to-date deficit of \$11,357, a significant reduction in our deficit. Our 2018 deficit is less than in 2015, 2016, or 2017. We committed to a 2018 OCWM (Our Church's Wider Mission) contribution of \$45,726, or about \$3,810 a month. The contributions to OCWM in December were fantastic, totaling \$5,970.84! Our total contributions of \$45,763.64 let us meet our 2018 commitment, actually exceeding it by \$37.64.

Staff Reports:

Rev. Sue Bertollette, Senior Pastor:

Sue stated a task force composed of five staff and 15 church members has been formed to respond in the event of an emergency, active shooter, or other traumatic incident. Bill Leslie and Tom Beggs attended a symposium in November and presented information to the task force. St. John's is meeting with local law enforcement to tour the building. The 15 church members were chosen based on various criteria: attending different services, seated in different locations, previous emergency response preparedness training, and medical training.

David Conver presented St. John's with a bequest from the estate of Carolyn Byers for \$143,000. This is an undesignated bequest with 10% going to the GEM fund, 30% to endowment, 30% to the immediate-needs fund, and 30% to capital projects.

The theme for the Wednesday evening Lenten study was inspired by Kate Bowler's book *Everything Happens for a Reason and other Lies I've Loved*. The book will encourage conversation about statements made by Christians without thinking.

Rev. Addie Stong, Associate Pastor:

Addie presented Council with a book totaling over 100 postcards from the summer postcard project, which will be available in the library.

The MLK Service Project for youth has been canceled due to poor attendance. The youth are either unavailable or did not sign up for this yearly service project. Addie is challenging people of all ages to say 'Yes' to church functions and 'No' to others. She expressed concern for Sunday School and VBS attendance.

David Furniss, Minister of Music:

David thanked the Deacons for the poinsettia arrangements for the Christmas holiday.

The **Artist Series** on February 10 at 4 PM will be presented by the Chester County Chamber Singers and the R5 Horn Club.

The **March 10 concert** will be based on the Psalms and will include organ, hymns, and commentary by Rev. Sue and Rev. Addie.

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Elijah will be presented on April 28 with St. John's Chancel Choir and friends along with Trinity Lutheran Church, Perkasio.

Wednesday, **May 8, Westmont College** will be at St. John's for a concert. David will be looking for host families for an overnight for these students.

David will be presenting a Tuesday noon AGO concert on **January 29** at St. Luke's UCC, North Wales.

Abbie Lampe, Minister of Music for Children and Youth:

David stated the Children's choir is off to a good start with many singers. Sunday services are scheduled.

Lisa Delp, Office Administrator:

Lisa stated the plea to the congregation for donations to the Good Samaritan Fund and grocery cards was well received. Over \$3900 was donated to the Good Samaritan Fund and \$875 was received in gift cards. Lisa stated the need is great in the winter for food, gas, utilities, and rent help. She thanked St. John's congregation for their generosity.

New Business:

Sue reported speaking with Rev. Mark from Vision and Mission Ministries, Inc., which does work in India. In the past, St. John's has helped this organization with completing a modest worship building. Donations from the 2017 Women's Tea went toward helping rescue young girls who had been sold into prostitution.

Currently, the organization is fighting against the persecution of women and teaching them the life-skill of sewing. There is a need for additional sewing machines. Approximate cost of each machine is \$300. A unanimous motion was passed to donate \$3000 from the GEM Fund to Vision and Mission Ministries, Inc.

Board of Trustees:

At the January meeting the Trustees welcomed new members Mark Bruen and Harry Sherlock. Mike Donahue will also be joining us at the February meeting.

A much-needed new sound system will be installed by *Clear Sound* on January 29, 30, and 31. At that time we hope to get a new recording system for the services as well as repair of, or new, handheld microphones.

We are looking at replacing some windows in Rev. Sue's office and seeing what can be done with the lower stained glass windows in the sanctuary to protect them and to prevent air infiltration.

Quite a few projects are ahead for 2019, not the least being the painting of the sanctuary, which hasn't been done in over 30 years. A quote from an outside vendor made this project cost prohibitive if done externally so we are now considering doing this project in-house.

We will be presenting our proposal at the next council meeting, so look forward to news on that front.

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Board of Elders:

Elders worked on the schedule for greeters for the Sunday 10:15 service and discussed Ash Wednesday's potluck dinner.


Each time you participate in Blanket Sunday, you are giving a hand-up to people in need and enabling them to feel the warmth of compassion and hope.

NEWS FROM THE PEWS

As I write to you this month, I am taking a break from making snow angels in the inch or so of snow that came down overnight, and I'm pondering some rather serious matters

important to St. John's and the safety of all who use our building each day. Even this little church mouse is aware of how scary our world has become, especially when places of safe refuge—like churches—no longer feel safe because deeply troubled or angry people with weapons in hand turn sacred spaces into places of carnage and tragedy.

I mention this because I want you to know that St. John's is on top of this important matter. Just the other Sunday after worship, St. John's Emergency Preparedness Task Force met to learn more about a special symposium that had been attended by two of St. John's members—a symposium focused on how to deal with active shooters and other intruders. Listening to the news in recent days, we have learned that not even places of worship are exempt from the kind of tragedy set in motion by someone hell-bent on creating havoc and destruction. St. John's Task Force is made up of 20 people who sit in different locations in our Sanctuary on Sunday morning, who worship at different worship services, who come from a variety of backgrounds (military, healthcare professionals, teachers, emergency responders, etc.), and who understand the importance of creating a space in which compassion for others and a careful vigilance regarding our surroundings are both important.

In the very near future, the Task Force will be meeting with local law enforcement officers and working to devise a safety plan. There will also be an opportunity for all members of St. John's to learn more about what each one of us can do (including this little church mouse) to better prepare for the unthinkable.

I share this with you not to alarm you but so that we might be able to work together to make our church a place where all who come feel safe and are able to focus on what matters most as we gather to worship and do God's work. Stay tuned and, in the meantime, may we all be looking out for one another!

Pennsylvania Southeast Conference's Disaster Recovery ministry works to prepare congregations to deal with disaster events by providing preparedness training and acting as a communication nexus for receiving and dispersing human services referrals, volunteer relief opportunities, recovery supplies availability, and timely information on disaster management. The Conference Disaster Coordinator, Rev. Karl Jones Jr., represents PSEC in his work with the wider church and other faith-based and community organizations to constantly discover and disseminate best practices for dealing with disaster.

All disaster recovery activities are coordinated with the UCC National Disaster Ministry, which oversees related activities on the national level.
