## *Our Present AND Our Future*

Just a few Sundays ago, several of St. John's youth claimed a significant leadership role in our Sunday morning worship services, having chosen the hymns we sang, read Scripture, written and offered the prayers, and participated in our choirs. In addition, younger children from St. John's Brownie troops served as greeters and acolytes. Even though I have had the privilege of celebrating 39 Youth Sundays at St. John's, it never grows old for me and it never ceases to renew my hope for the Church and for our world in general. One thing I can tell you with certainty: while our youth may come and go, grow up and move on or wander away, many manage to find their way back to us, and what they share ~ however and whenever they share it ~ is worth our time and attention.

As I reflect on that Youth Sunday experience, made possible largely due to the efforts of Pastor Addie and those who work closely with her, I find myself feeling deep gratitude for the commitment of so many who nurture and guide our youth week in and week out. My prayer is that we will never take for granted our youth or the caring adults who work with them. I pray also that, instead of primarily talking about our youth as the future of St. John's, we will be constantly looking for ways to recognize and celebrate them here and now in the present. Rather than eagerly anticipating how we will pass the baton to them so that those of us who are older might step back and away, may we instead invite them to join the symphony begun by our fore bearers in the faith over 143 years ago ~ a symphony in which many of us have participated for a very long time ~ so that we might make music together. May we dare to learn with and from each other, encouraging our youth to add their unique voice, tone and tempo to the songs that move us, define us, and make us the wonderfully motley crew that we are.

In closing, I offer a portion of the prayer shared on Youth Sunday by members of the Jr/Sr High Sunday School Class: "Dear God, our world is in pain in so many ways. There are people who are hungry, people who are in danger, people with no place to live or call home, leaders who are unjust, people who are dangerous, people who are hurting, and people who hurt others and your creation. In the midst of all of that pain, however, is hope. People who have a positive and lasting impact on our lives: teachers, mentors, and friends who shape our lives, parents and family members who will always be there for us. We pray that they and we will continue to be positive influences in people's lives and in the world. May we stay true to ourselves and to our morals and to our call."

## Church Council News



### **Financial Report, Sandy and Bob Taylor, Cotreasurers:**

We have begun the year with two back-to-back good months. We haven't accomplished that for many years.

Our February income (including the budgeted transfer from our investments) was \$48,161, exceeding our expenses of \$45,328. Year-to-date our income including transfers has exceeded our expenses by \$9,022, a very good start to the year. We committed to a 2019 Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM) contribution of \$46,460, or about \$3,872 a month. This month's contribution of \$3,459 brings our year-to-date total to \$6,628, or 15% below the pace we need. Let's get back on track in this important part of our church life. ### **Staff Reports:**

#### **Rev. Dr. Sue Bertolette, Senior Pastor:**

The Lenten Study from March 13 to April 10 will be held Wednesday evenings in the Library from 7:30 to 8:45 PM. Inspired by Kate Bowler's book *Everything Happens for a Reason and other Lies I've Loved*, Christians will be challenged in what they say and when they say it. All are invited.

A new-members gathering will be held after worship on Sunday, March 31.

A draft design by Aly Faga for T-shirts and polo shirts for members of St. John's with the logo "Drawing the Circle Wide" was shown to Council. They should be available before Lansdale Day. The shirts are an effort to say St. John's is an authentic and caring church in the community. This will be a fundraiser for bus transportation to Purdue University for the National Youth Event.

### **Abbie Lampe, Minister of Music for Children and Youth:**

The Children's Choir participated in Youth Sunday with a good turnout.

They attended a workshop at Trinity Lutheran Church on Saturday, March 9, with a focus on engaging the congregation in singing. It included incorporating creativity in music. The Choir is continuing their work on the musical *Elijah* for Sunday, May 5. Abbie is beginning to involve the Sunday School classes in their music.

### **Old Business:**

The Emergency Preparedness Team is continuing their work on church safety. An update was in the recent church bulletin.

### **New Business:**

#### Painting of the Sanctuary

The Trustees presented an estimate of \$20,000 to \$25,000 to paint the sanctuary. This includes all equipment and paint. The cost would be incurred over a period of time with funds from the Capitol Projects Account. Volunteers will be recruited to assist Harry Sherlock and Leroy Horst in painting. Painting will not interfere with Sunday worship or other activities that use the sanctuary. Repairs will be made prior to any painting.

A motion to approve spending up to \$5,000 for Phase I painting and beginning an initiative with the congregation to solicit funds for the purchase of gallons of paint to offset the cost of paint and supplies was passed unanimously.

#### Stewardship of St. John's Endowment/Formation of a Visioning Team

In an effort to address the concerns of the congregation about what is the best use of St. John's Endowment Fund, a Visioning Team is being formed, which will begin its work by identifying St. John's core values, carefully considering what must be done to honor the wishes of those members (past and present) whose gifts have made the Endowment Fund possible, and dialoging about possible mission and outreach projects for which St. John's members could claim ownership and which would be in keeping with what we believe God is calling us to do and become.



## News from the Pews

Perhaps you've heard some of the "buzz" around St. John's about the lift that has been purchased recently to be used in the Sanctuary to change light bulbs in the very high light fixtures, facilitate maintenance in that massive space, and enable our Building and Grounds Supervisor, Leroy Horst, along with skilled volunteers, to paint the Sanctuary in the months ahead. This little church mouse has been watching with fascination as Leroy and fellow painters have been learning how to safely maneuver this large and heavy piece of equipment in anticipation of putting it to good use to reach the high and lofty places which are everywhere in St. John's beautiful worship space.



From what I've learned listening carefully at recent Trustee and Council meetings, the lift purchase is an illustration of good stewardship. How so? Purchased at half the cost of a brand new one, the lift (which is in "like new" condition) will enable Leroy and crew to paint the Sanctuary for far less than the church would have to pay if painters had to be hired. Based on estimates Leroy has gotten from professional painters, the savings to St. John's will be around \$60,000 when all is said and done—not to mention that owning the lift allows the painting to be completed over a period of time, in manageable pieces, so as not to disrupt worship or the many things that need to happen in the Sanctuary in the course of every week. In case you were wondering, the last time the Sanctuary was painted was over 30 years ago. Leroy and his crew are experienced painters!

I learned all of this by attending church meetings and listening intently from my vantage point perched in the corner where no one sees this little church mouse, but I don't miss much! And the best part of all? I just may get the chance to take a ride on the lift because Leroy has offered to take Rev. Sue up to the heights on the lift one of these days, and I will most like likely sneak along when she goes for that ride. Even though Rev. Sue is not fond of heights, she is a firm believer that every now and then, it is good to view life from another vantage point. I can't wait to see what the view is like from on high, but rest assured, I still prefer my vantage point from the pews, where I hope you will join me in the weeks ahead as we journey together through Lent toward the wonderful celebration of Easter.

## GENERAL SYNOD 2019



I have the distinct pleasure and honor to serve as a delegate for the Pennsylvania Southeast Conference at the 32nd General Synod of the United Church of Christ.

Every two years, the General Synod of the UCC brings together delegates and visitors from every corner of our denomination to experience and participate in dynamic workshops, generative plenary sessions, inspirational worship, engaging youth activities, and special banquets and luncheons. This year's General Synod will be hosted by Wisconsin Conference in Milwaukee, June 21 through 25.

The theme for General Synod is based on Matthew 5:16: "In the same way let your light shine before others ...." As a delegate of the Pennsylvania Southeast Conference, I will also be responsible for participating in the finalization process for the Resolution to which I will be assigned, as well as voting my conscience on all resolutions presented to the voting body. In short, the delegates to General Synod will conduct the business of the denomination and set priorities for our ministries.

This year marks my fourth term serving as a delegate for our Conference. Together with the delegates from across our denomination, as well as visitors, we will be offered an opportunity to stand up for issues that demand a faithful witness, to worship together, and to participate in local community service projects. I ask you to keep the members of our Conference and all conference delegations and visitors in your prayers, so that we may faithfully listen for God's call to each of us individually, as members of our local church and as a member of the United Church of Christ and, together, share the light of Christ with our neighbors, both near and far.

A credit card company ad asks, "What's in your wallet?" Do you know what all the different kinds of envelopes are in the offering box you



receive each year? In 3 *Enlightener* issues each type will be highlighted, starting with the most familiar. Herald and Enlightenment support is the first envelope in the box, greeting you with a new year. It helps to defray the cost of printing and mailing our church newsletters.

Current Operating Expenses include costs for St. John's ministries, office, building maintenance, and staff salaries and benefits. These are the plain white envelopes stamped with the dates of every Sunday in the year. You may submit them weekly, monthly, quarterly, or however you wish to.

OCWM - Our Church's Wider Mission giving is also included in the weekly white envelopes. Having it on the weekly envelopes reminds us that it is important to give regularly to the national and conference levels of the United Church of Christ. The national office oversees national and global UCC ministry. Its website explains that "Your gifts to OCWM help the UCC spread God's love to more people in more places than any one of us can do alone." Some of the ministries are emergency and disaster relief, justice projects, refugee assistance, new and renewing churches, youth and young adults programs, leadership development, and retired clergy support. Our Southeast Pennsylvania Conference mirrors many of the same ministries on a local level.

General Capital Projects envelopes are trimmed in red and appear monthly. These are not for regular needs, but rather special projects. Regular giving ensures that money is available when a capital project occurs, thus avoiding the need to ask for donations after a project is identified. An example of a capital project is the razing of Anchor House.

Special Communion Offering envelopes are green and appear when Communion is offered during Sunday morning worship. Epiphany, Easter, Pentecost, August, Worldwide Communion, and Advent/Christmas.
