The Hard Work of Letting Go and Sparking Joy

In the weeks leading up to Easter, I preached about the importance of letting go ~ not only of things we no longer need or use, but also of things we value deeply ~ in order to spark joy in our own lives and in the lives of others. I made the observation that letting go, especially of that which is comfortable and familiar, is seldom easy, yet letting go of things, ideas and attitudes that weigh us down and hold us back is crucial if we are to live the lives God created us to live. We cannot take hold of the future if we are clutching for dear life onto the past. Joseph Campbell wrote: "We must let go of the life we have planned so as to have the life that is waiting for us."

Although Easter Sunday has come and gone, the season of Easter has just begun, and will carry us all the way to Pentecost on June 9th. I call this to our attention because I've noticed that, while letting go of things during the season of Lent was something many of us did with conviction and enthusiasm, what was let go of as part of a Lenten discipline has a way of creeping back into our lives and grabbing hold of us when we least expect it. Living our lives with unclenched hands ~ that is, with hands open to receiving what God has to offer and open to reaching out to help others in need ~ requires diligence, intentionality and hard work. And yes, it often involves letting go of things we treasure, and sharing the abundance we possess so that others might catch a glimpse of the God in whom we have placed our faith and trust.

Sadly, for many individuals and churches, good stewardship is understood to mean carefully guarding what we have while ever saving for the future, for that proverbial "rainy day." When things are given away freely or money is spent on that which some deem unnecessary, the conclusion is that such actions are wasteful and worse yet, sinful. Certainly that was the case when Mary, sister of Martha and Lazarus, chose to pour an entire pound of expensive perfume on Jesus' feet. Judas protested, claiming the perfume should have been sold and the money used to help the poor, but not surprisingly, Judas had ulterior motives (he wanted the money for himself), and Jesus chose to side with Mary.

Knowing when to risk being extravagant ~ when to pull out all the stops, when to give it all away ~ is, and always will be, the challenge of following the risen Christ. Jesus sparked joy when he gave it all away on the cross, holding back nothing because he loved us so much. During this Easter season, may we take time to ponder what it might look like if we chose to do the same and dared to open our hands and hearts to what God has waiting for us.

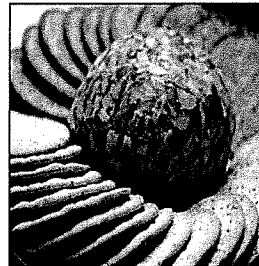

Helpful Hints for Nursery Volunteers

- 1) Introduce yourself to members/persons whose children will be in the nursery.
- 2) Login and -out Book. Have child's responsible person sign in and out when dropping child off and picking up.
- 3) Have responsible person fill out Child Name Tag (in basket) with info and make sure responsible person provides their cell number to get in contact, if needed. Place name tag on back of child's clothing.
- 4) Alternate way of contacting parent or responsible person. Provide "Lobster" paging device to parent to use during service (provide to new members; instructions for use are located next to paging system).
- 5) Turn on speaker to hear the service. Adjust volume, as needed, to hear church service. (The on/off switch is located on back of speaker at the middle top and volume button is located on the front with up/down arrow for volume control. Please make sure speaker is plugged into outlet).
- 6) After children's sermon: Please LOCK nursery door. This is new in response to St John's Emergency Preparedness Protocol.
- 7) Snacks are to be given out generally around the time of the Offertory during the service.

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- Parents, please let nursery staff know if your child can have the snack that is provided. If you DO NOT want your child to have this snack, please provide your own and inform nursery staff of your wishes.
 - a. Water (water fountain outside door to nursery)
 - b. Animal crackers
 - c. Dixie cups, napkins, and animal crackers are located in bottom cabinets of counter.
- 8) If you are using bottled water, please date and mark bottle "St. John's." Place in refrigerator in nursery room. This refrigerator belongs to Lansdale Montessori School. Please DO NOT use their items in refrigerator.
- 9) Please have children assist you in toy "cleanup" time.
- 10) A portable gate play area is available to set up for the safety of all children in the nursery.
- 11) A Pack and Go is available for infants and young toddlers.
- 12) A changing table is available.
- 13) Please contact a member of the Board of Educators with any questions.

Spring has definitely sprung! As I write to you this month, it is after having ventured out onto the grounds surrounding the

church, which, I must confess, requires a bit of bravery on this little church mouse's part because there are animals outdoors that would enjoy having me for lunch! News From Church Council



Financial Report:

Sandy and Bob Taylor, Cotreasurers:

After two very good months to start the year, March 2019 was not so good. Our March income (including the budgeted transfer from our investments) was lower than hoped at \$40,014, falling well short of our monthly expenses of \$47,806. Nonetheless, year-to-date our income including transfers still exceeds our expenses by \$1,949. A good April will keep us on track. We committed to a 2019 "Our Church's Wider Mission" (OCWM) contribution of \$46,460, or about \$3,872 a month. This month's contributions of \$3,001 bring our year-to-date total to \$9,629, or 17% below the pace we need. It's time we attended to this shortfall. We don't want to fall behind, as this can make catching up by yearend difficult. Moreover, as our contributions are forwarded monthly, a shortfall can impact the UCC's ability to achieve our national and international goals in the short term even if we "catch up" by yearend. Please feel free to share your questions or concerns with our cotreasurers, Sandy and Bob Taylor.

Staff Reports:

Rev. Dr. Sue Bertolette, Senior Pastor:

Rev. Sue asked those in attendance to be mindful of many in the congregation needing prayers. One person was in attendance at the March 31 New Member meeting. There are others who could not attend on March 31 but are interested in joining St. John's. New members will be received on Sunday, April 28. The Lenten Study is continuing with inspiration from Kate Bowler's book *Everything Happens for a Reason and other Lies I've Loved*. The security of Sunday morning worship has begun. Tom Beggs met with ushers and Bill Leslie is in communication with those involved. Questions or concerns can be directed to the Emergency Preparedness team members, staff, or any council member.

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Rev. Addie Stong, Associate Pastor:

No report this month. Absent due to illness.

David Furniss, Minister of Music:

David reminded council of many upcoming dates and activities at St. John's, including the *Elijah* Concert, April 28, and the children's musical *Elijah* and the AGO Event (American Guild of Organists), May 5. St. John's has been asked to host this event. The Westmont College Choir and Chamber Singers from Santa Barbara, California, will present a concert at 7 PM. Host families are needed to provide accommodations for one overnight for students after the concert, with a return by 8 AM the next morning.

Noon recitals by the AGO Chapter will be held every Tuesday in May. David will perform at the last recital on June 4.

Abbie Lampe, Minister of Music for Children and Youth:

The children's version of *Elijah* is progressing. The choir and Sunday School children are learning their music and the Junior/Senior High students will be narrators.

The end of the year party will be Wednesday, May 15.

Lisa Delp, Office Administrator:

Plains Park at Plains Mennonite Church has been reserved for the church picnic.

Nursery safety for volunteers will be held based upon guideline suggestions from the Emergency Preparedness Team.

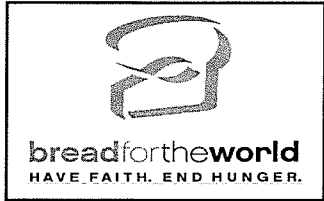

BREAD FOR THE WORLD OFFERING OF LETTERS 2019

Each year thousands of churches of many faiths take part in Bread for the World’s Offering of Letters to Congress. To support this year’s Offering of Letters campaign, “Better Nutrition, Better Tomorrow,” St. John’s Outreach Team will sponsor a letter-writing event on May 12 after both worship services, urging Congress to accelerate progress on global nutrition and increase funding for nutrition programs.

Every child deserves a chance to thrive. There is strong evidence that good nutrition in the first 1000 days of a child’s life is essential for healthy growth and development. In countries such as Ghana and Honduras, improved child nutrition has contributed to a significant reduction in stunting, which occurs when a child does not develop properly because of chronic malnutrition.

On May 12, Mother’s Day, please join us in raising our collective “voice” in letters to Congress on behalf of millions of mothers who need help to give their children a good, healthy start in life.
