I have lost track of the many little ones I have held in my arms and baptized, the young people on whose heads I have placed my hands as they were confirmed, the couples at whose weddings I have officiated, and the beloved members and friends of St. John's I have surrounded with prayer and blessing as they were laid to rest at the end of their lives here on earth.

In describing my ministry at St. John's, I have been intentional in identifying it as having been a privilege to serve you, because in every respect, it has been. You have invited me into your lives in the midst of both unspeakable tragedy and great joy, and have trusted me to hold in confidence painful pieces of your past. I have taken none of this for granted and give thanks daily for the ways in which you have enriched my life. As I look forward to what lies ahead, I am grateful beyond words for the countless ways that you have filled these past forty-two years to the brim with memories I will cherish, learnings I will always value and love that will continue to sustain me through thick and thin . . . all gifts without price!

In 1962 a marine biologist, Rachel Carson, wrote a book titled "Silent Spring" about the dangers of pesticides in the environment. It was an introduction to the effects of air and water pollution—the beginning of the impact of environmental pollutants. Unfortunately, before there was more follow-up to these dangers to the earth, Ms. Carson passed away from cancer two years later.

The mid to late 1800s was the beginning of the industrial revolution. It was a huge boost to our economy and mass production of goods. This mass production helped to create increased supplies for WWI and WWII. Unfortunately, these advances led to mass burning of fossil fuels. We blindly went ahead with these advances.

It would take decades to realize the effects of the dangers of this progress. Another aspect of this progress was the mass production of the automobile, further endangering the environment. The result was what we now know as Global Warming. Melting of polar icecaps and glaciers has increased water levels and created more floods. Another result was the severity of pollution leading to the near extinction of species of terrestrial and marine life.

Fortunately, in the past couple of decades, we have come to realize these dangers and started to create solutions. "Silent Spring" only marked the beginning of environmental destruction and ways to combat it. Climate change has led to strategies for climate control.

Most recently, books and documentaries have highlighted problems and solutions to this manmade destruction of our earth. Documentaries like "The 11th Hour," "An Inconvenient Truth," and "Before the Flood" have been the Paul Revere of this warning.

What are the causes and effects of Global Warming? Main contributors are the burning of fossil fuels, the destruction of rain forests, and greenhouse gases. We must look for alternatives: solar and wind energy, electric vehicles, better recycling practices, and planting of vegetation and trees.

To be clear, we must increase the combatants of climate change. We are experiencing more destructive hurricanes, larger and more destructive fires, melting of the polar icecaps and glaciers, increasing water levels, and hotter temperatures. The effects of climate change are mounting faster than scientists had predicted. According to the Intergovernmental *Panel* on *Climate* Change (IPCC), if the earth's temperatures increase more than 1.5 degrees Centigrade, the damage might be irreversible. The good news is we are better educated to meet these challenges.

Educate yourself and do your small part to change the course of climate change. Reach out to elected officials concerning this dire situation. Follow younger people such as Greta Thunberg to protect this earth we live on and our future generations. Steven Bossert

Financial Report, Matt Carson: February was another good month for St. John's. Our income of \$55,477.80 exceeded our

expenses, enabling us to stay above budget by 7.7% for the year. Thanks for the generosity of our members' continued donations as tithes and offerings.

Our 2022 commitment to "Our Church's Wider Mission" (OCWM) is \$48,272. February was another great month, bringing total donations to \$10,999 for the year.
