# As Things Draw to a Close

Over the course of the past few months, I have used the front page of *The Enlightener* to do a bit of reflecting on my 42 years among you at St. John's, looking back and looking forward. As I write for the last time (the front page in June will be claimed by Pastor Addie as she reflects on the time of transition in the midst of which the church now finds itself), I have decided to share with you the sermon messages I consider to be most important. It has been said that preachers who spend many years in the same ministry setting have a way of lifting up a handful of important themes in their sermons, no matter what the scripture reference might be, and that has certainly been true of my preaching at St. John's over the years.

The messages that have mattered most to me include: 1) Ours is a God who will never abandon or forsake us, no matter what. Because of God's undying love for us, there is nothing we can do that would cause God to love us less, or more. 2) We are our sisters' and brothers' keepers, called to be in community in good times and in bad. 3) Living in community as people of faith, we learn that being in relationship is almost always far more important than being right. 4) Although God holds us accountable for the way we live and the decisions we make, our God is not primarily a God of judgement who metes out punishment when we make mistakes. Ours is a God of grace, mercy, and forgiveness ~ a God whose deepest desire is to draw us near, as a hen gathers her chicks under wing. 5) How we say what we say matters. As followers of Christ, we are called to speak the truth in love, to be slow to speak and slow to anger, quick to listen and learn.

While these messages are not the only ones I have sought to instill in those I have been called to serve, they are truths that are near and dear to me. The apostle Paul's words in Romans 12 are also near to my heart, reminding us of the importance of rejoicing with those who rejoice and weeping with those who weep, living in harmony with one another, as much as it is possible for us to do so. As my ministry among you draws to a close, my prayer is that you will continue the good work we have begun together. May the light of Christ shine brightly through you as individuals and through the wonderfully motley crew that is St. John's. You are the best!

# Financial Report: Matt Carson:

March was not as good as prior months this year. Our income of \$43,852.14 was less than our expenses of \$51,228.00, a monthly shortfall of 14%. However, we're still in good shape; year-to-date we remain positive by about 1% thanks to a great January and February.

Monthly tithes and offerings fell short of our goal by over 12%, with \$30,280 received. Operating expenses also exceeded the budget by around 7% in March due to expenditures to heat the building and for snow removal.

Our 2022 commitment to OCWM is \$3,364/month. March donations were \$3,102, just shy of the monthly goal. We are still ahead of the budgeted amount year-to-date by about \$4,000. The congregation has donated \$6651.11 toward Ukraine Relief.

# Church Security Update

Mark Bruen attended a security meeting with local police and approximately 100 faith-based organizations. There were three speakers:

- 1) NTAC (National Threat Assessment Center) gave an overview of world incidents and attacks.
- 2) LCBC Church leader. This organization has 16 locations throughout Pennsylvania, one located in Harleysville. Mark suggested their head of security be contacted for further discussion.
- PEMA, a nonprofit security grant program for security updates.

The congregation has donated \$6,651.11 to date, not including the GEM Fund donation from Council. An additional \$4,000 from the GEM Fund was designated to support Ukraine Relief.

We have exciting news! St John's is now offering online giving services. This option is an alternative to cash or check donations. You can still give through traditional methods, but you can now make one-time or recurring gifts online with a credit/debit card or electronic check. To give online through our secure platform, visit app.easytithe.com/app/giving/stjohnsucc. A link to this giving site will be available on our website soon. You can also scan this QR code to open the online giving portal:




- Choose the fund name from the dropdown list. Some of the funds are categories, which will allow you to select a subfund name as well.
- 2. Add the amount you'd like to give.
- 3. Click "Recurring" on the right side of the form if you wish to enable auto donations.
- 4. If you do not have a profile set up, it will prompt you to register.
- 5. Select how often you'd like to give under frequency and select the start date.
- 6. Enter your method of payment (Visa, Mastercard, Discover, AMEX, or ACH).
- 7. Click "Give Now" if the amount and frequency are correct. An email will be sent confirming the information of your gift as well as a separate email with your login information.

There is a processing fee to St. John's for this service that you can choose to add to your donation, allowing St. John's to make full use of your contributions. Processing fees using a credit card are higher than direct bank withdrawals (ACH). If you wish to donate electronically to St. John's without these fees, check with your bank for online banking options. Depending on your bank, the option to send a check to St John's via online banking may not have fees.


#### From the Creation Stewards



"OUT OF THE MOUTHS OF BABES" (Told to me by a friend about her granddaughter's activism.)

In June of 2021 Momo (the grandmother) gifted Jules with a book about Earth Day for her seventh birthday. The child has a penchant for reading everything she can, and quickly absorbed the book, taking its message to heart. Jules's parents are very environmentally conscientious, modeling concern for the Earth as well. September rolled around and Jules came home from second grade disturbed that the lunchroom offered only plasticware. She knew that was bad for the Earth and said to her mom "I guess I will have to become President to solve this problem." Her mother explained that one doesn't have to become President to solve problems and encouraged her to find out why they use plastic. Wasting no time, Jules asked a cafeteria lady why, and found that they did not have a dishwasher. Asking her best friend, Katie, to illustrate a letter, Jules wrote to her teacher with possible solutions to the problem: get a sink, bring utensils from home, get a dishwasher. Imagine the teacher's surprise when she was handed this letter! In late October, after helping the girls "put it in grown-up words (edit it)," the teacher suggested Jules take it to the principal. Jules was nervous but remained determined. Bravely she took it to the principal, who read it and said she thought she could solve the problem and would get back to her. Christmas came and went, and Jules was not seeing any improvement. In February Jules decided to go to school early one day to ask the principal why she had not heard from her. Perhaps the principal was too busy. Jules offered to help her. The principal promised to get back to her this time. The very next week the principal sought Jules as she came into school. They walked to the cafeteria, and there was a brand-new dishwasher! The perseverance of this child is heartening. This may be one small instance of Earth care but it shows how every step we take helps. I am happy there are people like Jules in this world. It seems the youth are taking on the problem past generations are leaving them. Before I leave this world I hope I can be brave like Jules and not only do my part but encourage others.

More from the Creation Stewards



As you all know by now, things happen at St. John's that reinforce that God is with us on our journey. And so it is with the Creation Stewards. Events are coming to us that are exciting, and perfectly aligned with our priorities. Here is what has happened in the last several weeks:

Liz Vanderburg put us in touch with PAR Recycles, which is a nonprofit organization that employs formerly incarcerated citizens to run local electronics recycling events (see table on page 10). If you have ever gone to the North Penn High School recycling event (which they run), you know it gets very crowded with long waiting lines. So we have signed up with PAR Recycles to have a St. John's electronic recycling event on Saturday, September 24, from 10 AM to 3 PM. They take care of organizing the event, but we may need to supply some volunteers to help direct traffic and unload items. This fits perfectly with our goals of helping protect the environment and addressing income inequality.

Pat and Ken Rieker mentioned that Lansdale is having a Garden Tour on July 9 and suggested including St. John's Gardens on the tour. When I contacted the organizer, it happens that she walks her dog every day past our gardens and was planning to contact us to see if we would be willing to participate! So we will be included on the garden tour. We will need a few volunteers to be present just to help answer questions and show visitors around. The garden tour will include information on the Garden of Health in Harleysville, which provides locally grown produce to area food banks.

As if that's not enough, Marie Carota is publishing a children's book about nature. She is in the process of getting it copyrighted and printed. She has agreed to do a book signing at the Garden Tour and donate any net proceeds to the Garden of Health.

The goal is to have the Interim Pastor in place immediately after Rev. Sue's last Sunday. A small Transition Team, led by Liz Rivett (Council Vice-President, lizrivett@verizon.net 732.604.4180), is responsible for the search for an Interim Pastor voted on by Council. Team members are Dan Panachyda (ncwyeth1@verizon.net 215.368.6873), Grace Bruen (grace.bruen@gmail.com 215.518.4768), Jessica Carson (jessrice301@gmail.com 301.254.1311), Don Atkiss (datkiss@comcast.net 215.872.7487), Mark Bruen (markwbruen@gmail.com 215.872.6189) and Sally Atkiss (basketsal@yahoo.com 215.872.6168). Feel free to reach out to any of them with questions, concerns, or suggestions. We have also set up a **Celebration Team**, led by Pat Rieker, Amy Faga, and Sally Jarinko, to coordinate activities to recognize Rev. Sue leading up to her last Sunday. Please contact them with questions or comments.

A larger **Search Committee** will be established to identify candidates for the Settled Pastor, to be led by the Board of Elders, with additional members from congregation, representing the full breadth of diversity that is the St. John's "Motley Crew."

We are very fortunate to have an incredibly talented and dedicated ministerial staff, as well as excellent support staff in place. They play key roles in the selection process. We are also receiving significant support from Rev. Kevin McLemore, PSEC Associate Conference Minister for Search and Call.

Selecting a new Settled Pastor can take 12 to 18 months or longer. We are embarking on an important journey; finding the right person to lead us into a new chapter at St. John's will require input, support, and patience from you, our members and friends.


Five Years Ago: The Children's Choir shared a year's worth of songs they prepared for the Choristers Guild Festival in the Assembly Hall.

Nickole Florence was an adopted child of St. John's for 12 years (2007-2019). The Kalauman Center recently sent an update on her progress. "She [Nicole Florence] continues to participate actively in all the activities of the center and, in fact, she is one of our teacher facilitators during our weekly church school sessions and all other activities of the center for the younger sponsored children. Kalauman also continues to help Nickole in her school expenses using the funds we have saved for her through the years when St. John's was still supporting her.

Nickole is also very fortunate that when she aged out [of the program], George and Patricia Kaufmann, who are members of your church, decided to continue to support her. She has been able to attend Silliman, which is a very good private university in Dumaguete City. Nickole will finish her Bachelor of Science in Social Work this coming July 2022 and, in fact, have her one-year Internship at Kalauman. She has been instrumental in facilitating the fundraising for an openheart surgery for one of our sponsored children, which cost more than half a million pesos. There is a big possibility that Nickole will become one of the Kalauman staff, as they are now looking for someone. All of you are a big part of Nickole's success. Soon, she will be able to help her family and serve the community being a Social Worker."
