Fall is a season of transition, both for our natural world, and for our church community. As we continue to welcome Pastor Dale, I wanted to take the opportunity to put in context his work and time with us during this interim period. When Pastor Dale, first stepped on the scene, I jokingly referred to him as "Mary Poppins," flying in when we needed him most, with the intention of spending some very intentional time with us, and then moving along "when the wind changes" and we felt ready to move forward into our future.

It turns out, my Mary Poppins metaphor, while humorous and charming, does fit what Dale's purpose is in joining our church community during this tender and pivotal time. Much like the beloved character does with the Banks family to whom she comes, Pastor Dale comes to us with a purpose in this time of transition ~ not simply to be a placeholder or to intentionally change who we are or what we do, but to come alongside of us as we decide for ourselves who God has created us to be now, and in the years ahead. He is here to join in leading worship and providing pastoral care, yes, but he is also here to learn about us very intentionally as individuals and as a community, to help us evaluate and assess our needs and our wants, and to provide a new, helpful perspective in our time of discernment.

I know St. John's to be a community that leans into Jesus' call for us to "keep it real," opting for honesty and integrity over that which is disingenuous. During Pastor Dale's time with us, during his intentional meetings with individuals, families, and small groups, I will count on you to keep being the wonderfully motley crew that you are ~ colorful, open to change and growth, welcoming, authentic, loving, honest, nurturing, and true. Personally speaking, it has been a joy to work, laugh, and dream with Pastor Dale and I know that if we continue to invest in our time together, it will be, in a word, "supercalifragilisticexpialidocious."

I just love Pastor Addie's image of being compared to Mary Poppins when it comes to my role at St. John's as Interim Senior Pastor. I suppose I should have floated down into the sanctuary holding my umbrella on my first Sunday at St. John's! And Addie is right, I have dropped into your world; and not as a "placeholder," but as one whom the St. John's Transition Team has called to lead the congregation during a particular time. It's important that you have a sense of what an "Interim," or "Transitional" Pastor actually does. Below you'll find a thumbnail summary of some of the tasks I'll be working with on you all as you reflect, think, pray, and prepare for your next Senior Pastor. And just like Pastor Addie wrote, when my intentional time with you comes to an end, I'll fly away as the wind of God will have brought you a new Pastor, and new beginning! So here are some of the tasks involved with interim ministry:

- Bring whatever stability and dependability this or any congregation may need as it experiences transition
- Facilitate the congregation in identifying and articulating its Identity, Purpose (Mission), and Future Direction (The UCC Profile, a tool for pastoral searches, employs the following questions: Who are we now? Who is our neighbor? Who is God calling us to become?)
- Help in the process of surfacing and identifying the core values held by St. John's; those that are implicit within the fabric of the congregation, as well as those that could be considered aspirational
- Help the congregation and its leaders arrive at a "Vision" that is compelling, future oriented, as well as owned and celebrated. "What does the congregation want to see happen?"
- Aid in helping the congregation identify key trends over the last decade (both internal and external)
- Educate the congregation in terms of what is happening in American church life
- Frame key questions for church leadership such as: "Who are we reaching? Who are we missing, and why?
- Support the Associate pastor and Minister of Music in their making explicit their individual passion, vision, and aspirations
- Note: There are lots of assessments that come with interim ministry, including the surfacing of assumptions, "habits," and determining a congregation's tolerance for meaningful change








Rev. Sue's Favorite Children's Books





Notes From Church Council



Financial Report, Matt Carson:

September was another slow month for St. John's. Total income of \$36,639.33 fell short of our expenses of \$43,606.75. The shortfall is attributed to low tithes and offerings of \$23,499.75. The prior 6-year average for giving in September is \$27,236.20. Looking at annual income and expenses, we have received total income year-to-date of \$296,539.21 plus an investment transfer of \$88,366.00, leaving us with a deficit is \$42,926.

Our 2022 commitment to OCWM is \$48,272 for the year, or \$3,364 per month. September donations were \$2,428.00, bringing us to \$30,874.00 year-to-date.

Search and Call Update, Liz Rivett

We have provided information and signup sheets for Small Group Sessions with Pastor Dale. Please sign up for a session that is scheduled or contact Dale to set another date/time/location with friends or family.

This is a great opportunity to reach out to members or friends who have not been present on Sundays to ensure they have an opportunity to engage and be heard.

Soon the transition team will work with Dale to assemble a team to create St. John's Ministerial Profile, which will be posted to recruit our next Settled Pastor. The creation of the Profile is as much about the journey as it is about the end result. It will challenge us to carefully reflect on who we are today, who is our neighbor, and who is God calling us to be and serve. Anyone interested in contributing to the Profile will have the opportunity to do so, whether directly, as a member of the Profile team, or through other methods. The Small Group Sessions are a start on this journey. The Profile is not a confidential document.

Once the Profile is completed, the Elders, along with about three members of the congregation at large, will form a Search Committee. This is the team responsible for reviewing candidate profiles and conducting initial interviews. The Search Committee will then present a candidate to Council for a vote. If Council approves, the congregation will have an opportunity to hear the candidate preach and then vote on the candidate.

We have not created a timeline for this process to unfold yet. We are all taking a collective deep breath, allowing Pastor Dale to settle in with us, and us to settle in with him. The Transition Team is in conversation with Dale, and we will be sure to continue to communicate what unfolds next. We are approaching a very busy and sacred part of the Church year, and we want to be sure that we have the physical, mental, and spiritual strength to start this journey.

Role and Purpose of an Interim Pastor Dale Davis

It might be natural to think of an interim pastor (in this case, an Interim Senior Pastor) functioning as a "placeholder" until a search team can begin its role in calling a new pastor. However, the role of an interim pastor is more involved than simply filling a temporary void. Below is a list of some typical outcomes for which an interim pastor is engaged:

- Bring the stability and dependability a congregation needs as it experiences transition
- Facilitate the congregation in identifying and articulating its Identity, Purpose (Mission), and Future Direction. The UCC Ministerial Profile, a tool for pastoral searches, asks these questions: Who are we now? Who is our neighbor? Who is God calling us to become?
- Help in surfacing and identifying the core values held by St. John's—those implicit within the fabric of the congregation as well as those that could be considered aspirational
- Help the congregation and its leaders arrive at a Vision that is compelling, future oriented, owned, and celebrated. What does the congregation want to see happen?
- Help the congregation identify key trends over the past decade, internal and external: <u>SWOT</u> (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats)
 <u>MissionInsite</u> (demographics, population trends, projected concerns)
- Educating the congregation in terms of what is happening in American church life
- Frame key questions for church leadership, such as "Who are we reaching? Who are we missing, and why?
- Support the Associate Pastor and Minister of Music in making explicit their individual passion, vision, and aspirations
- There are many assessments that come with interim ministry—surfacing of assumptions and habits, and determining a congregation's tolerance for meaningful change

Dear Auntie Pat and all my sponsors at St. John's UCC,

It's another great day to write a letter for all of you! How was your day going? I hope it is really going well. Our classes for this school year started last August 22. My first day of school was nice, but I was a bit nervous. I was still in Grade 6 when COVID started and it has been two years since the last time I have gone to school. It was amazing to be able to go to school after a long time. I am happy to share with you that I have joined the Supreme Student Government representing Grade 8 students. This is really a new and challenging responsibility for me.

In my church, I've joined Glad Tidings Choir (GTC). We practice every Friday and Saturday afternoon in preparation for the Sunday worship. Me and my sister have also joined a Bible study for the youth. Last August, we had a camp which is one town away from our place. I am happy to make new friends, and they were so kind and nice. Unfortunately, some of us were not allowed to spend the night with the rest because we are not yet vaccinated. Last Sunday was Youth Sunday, and we had a celebration.
