St. John's Search and Call - November Update from the Visioning Team!

St. John's Visioning team has met with the congregation using our four quadrants of Visioning (Worship Spiritual Growth and Faith Formation, Fellowship and Care, Outreach, and Music) and gathered input from many groups to answer these 3 key questions:

Who are we? Who is our neighbor? What is God calling us to be?

Update on Visioning Sessions:

We have completed congregational visioning sessions on the Music, Fellowship and Care, Worship, Spiritual Growth and Faith Formation and Outreach quadrants. We have also met with staff, young families, and the church council boards to get their input. Significant input and ideas have been collected for our use in defining our path forward.

Visioning Process Observations and Findings:

The Visioning Team is analyzing the responses and information from our Visioning sessions and is completing the analysis phase. We are currently reviewing the data we collected and are looking for common threads and themes among them. Some of the themes that are emerging:

- Worship Service Themes Our staff collaborates well to create a worship service that is cohesive, from the hymns and chosen anthems to the relatable message. This is something important to us, and we want to make sure it continues.
- Community Involvement St John's has a past reputation of helping in the community with the creation and support of Manna on Main St. It is important that we continue in this way, looking for ways to connect with and provide support to local agencies and the communities they support. We are identifying and exploring more ways to reach out into our local community.
- Youth and Young Families How do we attract young families to St. John's? Do we need an alternative worship service, either an alternate day or a contemporary format? Many ideas for potential social activities were shared. How can we become involved with community activities such as First Fridays, Lansdale Days, etc.? As a response to this, we have initiated Wednesday Night Live as a way to invite more of the community into our church and provide an alternate day for people to gather and celebrate with one another.
- Cross Church Collaboration Much of what we want to do can be accomplished more efficiently if we work with other churches and faiths in the area. By combining our resources, we can make a larger impact in the community, while also providing opportunities to learn about other faiths.
- **Communication** How do we get our message out to the community about what St. John's has to offer, and how do we best learn what the community needs? Also, there is clearly a need for better communication within our community, so everyone is kept aware of opportunities to participate.

Visioning/Transition Timeline Overview:

We will use insights generated to shape our Vision for St. John's which will guide us in the creation of our church profile. All of this is in support of our ultimate goal: Calling a settled Senior Pastor who is called by God to help us achieve our Vision.

- Visioning (6-8 months): Initiated in March and 7 1/2 months have elapsed, includes Visioning sessions inclusive of insight generation and analysis.
- Church Profile (1-3 months): Currently forming the Profile Committee, Translating our Vision into the Church Profile.
- Search for Settled Pastor (6-12 months): Expected to start early 2024.



Notes From Church Council



Volunteer Opportunity: Wrapping Presence (Candi Young)

wrappingpresence.org
Candi Young presented the volunteer
opportunity to assist seniors in local nursing
homes at Christmas. Bill Cagney brought
Wrapping Presence to the attention of St.
John's.

Wrapping Presence began 28 years ago as an opportunity for seniors in nursing homes to be able to "buy" gifts for visiting family members. Residents can shop and have gifts wrapped. They receive a door decoration, cookies, and a Santa visit. Residents can shop for as many gifts as they need.

All gifts are donated, there is no money exchanged. It is staffed by all volunteers. The organization will visit a total of 18 nursing homes between Thanksgiving and the second week of December. St. John's would volunteer at Elm Terrace and Harborview, both in Lansdale. There are about 20 volunteers per site. Decorating gift bags could be a WNL activity. Bags would be decorated before Thanksgiving in preparation for the event. More information to follow on dates.

Financial Report: Matt Carson, Treasurer

In September we had income of \$39,334.50 (including the budgeted transfer of \$10,696.83) against expenses of \$48,389.97, a difference of \$9,055.47.

While income did fall short of expenses for the month, we received 28,637.67 in income (not including the transfer), which was a shortfall of budgeted income by \$1,204.33. Lower than expected income is due to lower than expected tithes and offering.

At this point in the year we have gross income (not including the transfer) of \$308,563.48, and have budgeted to receive \$319,803.00, meaning we are short \$11,239.52 from where we expected to be in terms of income YTD. Total expenses year to date are \$442,838.11 against budgeted expenses of \$450,822.86, meaning we have spent about 1.8% less than we expected to spend.

Donations received for Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM) for September were \$2,566; \$28,943.25 for 2023 YTD. Knowing that giving to OCWM is also stronger in the last quarter of the year, we would expect to have \$34,507 to date. We are behind our projection by \$5,564.

Exterior Restoration Project Update

We are continuing on the Exterior Restoration. Thanks to the generosity of St. John's members over the last couple of months the fund has grown significantly.



Special thanks to Don &

Barb Fretz for taking the lead and for their contribution and veggies in encouraging us on this endeavor.

We look forward to all of your continued support over the next few months as we try to fund the next phases.

As of September 25 we have received \$23,323 in donations toward the project. It should be noted that the phases, while alphabetical, are not in chronological order of importance.

Phase F: Front courtyard entrance wall above arch has been scheduled to be completed between October 2 and October 14 for a total of \$10,720. This leaves a balance of \$12,603 toward the next priority portion, which is:

Repair of Main Street and front courtyard arches for \$27,983. Additional funding of \$15,380 will be needed to complete this phase.

Unfortunately, it was recently brought to our attention that due to a software error from Disciple Masonry, a figure of \$19,282 for Phase C (rear wall of the education/office building) was incorrect. The figure should have been \$59,653, or a difference of an additional \$40,371, for a total of \$403,648 for the project.

Since Phase A has been completed and paid for in the amount of \$76,568 and Phase F for \$10,720 the remaining balance is now \$316,560 for the entire project.

We thank you for your donations and patience through this long, costly, but necessary project, and we will do our best to see that it is done in a professional and timely manner.
