We think of all the loss we have endured this year, the failed and strained relationships, the scars we bear, all the heartache we hold.


Tonight, we gather with different stories, different hurts, and different longings~ yet we are made one by the brokenness of our humanity and our need for Christ's light.

We come praying that that light will not be overcome by our many doubts. Tonight, we gather, just as we are, and God welcomes us.

God has promised to meet us here. Let us set down all the heavy burdens we carry and lean into the loving embrace of God.

SCRIPTURE

Psalm 22:1-5, 9-11a

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning? O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer; and by night but find no rest. Yet you are holy, enthroned on the praises of Israel. In you our ancestors trusted; they trusted, and you delivered them. To you they cried and were saved; in you they trusted, and were not put to shame. Yet it was you who took me from the womb; you kept me safe on my mother's breast. On you I was cast from my birth, and since my mother bore me you have been my God. Do not be far from me...Do not be far from me.

John 1:1-5

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overtake it.

LITANY OF REMEMBRANCE AND LIGHT

THE FIRST CANDLE IS LIT

We light this first candle of love to remember those whom we have loved and lost.

We pause to remember clearly, their faces, their voices, their presence.

We embrace and give thanks for the memories that bind them to us

in this season of expectation, when all Creation waits for the Light.

We remember them with love. May God's eternal love surround them.

O little town of Bethlehem, So still in our minds' eye With candle lights and starlit nights, And angels drawing nigh. Yet in thy dark streets soundeth The echoed wails of grief, Of ancient fears, of bombs and tears, Of agony and strife.

THE SECOND CANDLE IS LIT

We light this second candle of hope, to honor the times we have felt hopeless and without a way forward. We hold in our consciousness the pain of loss: loss of relationships, loss of trust, loss of jobs, loss of health, loss of faith, the loss of joy. We cling to the light of hope that shines upon us and pray that it illuminates a way out of the hole that grief often leaves us in.

We remember that through You all things are possible.

Refresh, restore, renew us and our world, O God, and lead us into Your future.

For Christ was born of Mary And Joseph, born in love; But soldiers came, in someone's name, With something left to prove. So Mary brought up Jesus In lands broken and cursed, To preach and sing of no more kings, Of peace to all the Earth.

THE THIRD CANDLE IS LIT

We light this third candle of joy and recall the many days and nights we have carried deep sadness, anxiety, and worry. We pause and remember the past weeks, months, and for some of us years, that have been heavy with our burdens. We accept and lay before you, God, the sharpness of memory, the sadness and grief, the hurt and fear, the anger and pain. We accept and lay before you the ways we feel we have fallen short, and the times we have spent blaming ourselves, and you, for all that we have suffered. We accept and lay before you the time we have walked alone, joyless and in darkness.

We remember that though we have journeyed far, and that, while lost, we may have turned away from the light, the light itself has not failed. We remember that though winter be upon us and though the night be dark, the joy of dawn will come, and dawn defeats the darkness.

How desperately, how desperately
That peace is needed now,
Which Love imparts to human hearts
To flower and to grow.
Our ears are numbed by anguish,
Cries from this world of sin.
Our weak souls yearn to feel the burn

THE FOURTH CANDLE IS LIT

We light this fourth candle of peace and acknowledge that the story of Jesus is one that began in abandonment, insecurity, and humbleness, in a time and land of war and strife. We think of the unrest and dis-ease in our own time, O God, and we offer it to You, asking that into our broken world, our wounded hearts, and outstretched hands, You will place the gift of peace.

We remember the One who shares our burdens, who shows us the way to the Light, and who journeys with us into all our tomorrows.

O holy Child of Bethlehem,
Reveal to us thy Way
Of justice, peace, and healing Grace;
Be born in us today.
We are the Christmas angels;
Help us glad tidings tell.
O walk with us, shine forth through us:
