One Year Ago: The Personnel Committee was searching for candidates to fill the Church Office Manager position pending Lisa's retirement.



Palm Sunday, April 13, marks the start of Holy Week, a period of reflection and remembrance leading up to Easter. Palms will be distributed in anticipation of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem during the 10:15 service.

Maundy Thursday, April 17, at 7 PM

This day honors Christ's Last Supper with his disciples, highlighting the significance of humility, selflessness, and service to others. A potluck dinner will be shared in the "Sanctuary." Join us as we recreate the Last Supper of Jesus Christ. For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. John 3:16-17

Prayer Vigil Reminder, April 17, at Noon

that starts Maundy Thursday, April 17, and runs
through Noon Good Friday, April 18, 2025. A

Good Friday, April 18, at 7 PM

As the Prayer Vigil continues, Good Friday commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus, focusing on the crucifixion, devotion, and remembering the sacrifice of Jesus. If you are unable to attend, consider quiet reflection of the significance of Jesus' death.

Holy Saturday, April 19, commemorates the day Jesus remained in the tomb after his crucifixion, bringing Lent to a close. This day is characterized by reflection, prayer, and anticipation of Easter.

Easter Sunday, April 20, at 7 AM

Easter commemorates the joy of Jesus' resurrection three days after his crucifixion. Jesus rose from the dead at sunrise. Join us for our 7 AM Sunrise Service, where we will celebrate the resurrection in a beautiful outdoor setting at White's Road Park, 400 Whites Rd., Lansdale. Please bring your own seating. We will share Communion in nature and provide some refreshments. This service will also include a nature-based Easter egg hunt for children. Watch for an announcement of change of venue in the event of inclement weather.

Easter Sunday, April 20, at 10:15 AM

This service will be held at the church, continuing the celebration of the resurrection, with shared Communion.

Notes from Church Council



Financial Report – Susan Donahue

1. Income vs. Budget:

- o January income was \$38,552.00.
- Of this total, \$33,570.28 came from tithes and offerings, falling short of the \$48,832.00 budgeted goal by \$15,261.72.

2. Expenses:

 January expenses were \$47,688.93, which is \$4,331.88 lower than the budgeted amount of \$52,020.81.

3. Overall Impact:

 Offering for January was well below expectations and expenses were lower than expected. While our income exceeded our expenses for the month, it was not enough to meet expenses annually.

Year-to-Date Financial Summary:

1. Income:

 Total year-to-date operating income is \$132,216, compared to a budgeted amount of \$154,336, creating a shortfall of \$22,120.

2. Expenses:

O Total year-to-date operating expenses are \$113,003, which is \$9,793 over the budgeted amount of \$103,210.

3. OCWM:

 Donations to Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM) for January and February were \$7,877 and \$4,071, respectively. The yearto-date total of \$11,948 is higher by \$1,589 of our year-to-date goal.

Deb Dayton reported for Kay. Three issues were mentioned: publications, honoring the memory of congregants, and Easter lilies. Deb will work with those involved regarding publications before changes are made.

Grace Marchione, Communications Coordinator:

Deb Dayton reported for Grace. Three items were highlighted: the Social Media Document, Instagram for St. John's, and the signboard.

Board Reports

Trustees:

- An entire rank of pipes in the sanctuary organ failed to operate recently. Steve Hendricks, in conjunction with Bill Klimas, a principal in the company that renovated our organ, assisted Steve via the internet, to repair the problem. We saved a substantial amount with the in-house repair.
- There is a leak in the flashing between the church and bell tower resulting in water in the sanctuary. The Trustees received a bid to repair the flashing on both sides of the tower. A savings of \$1200 will be realized by doing both sides of the tower rather than only the side that is obviously leaking.

Educators:

- Goodie boxes for 13 students were sent. Special thanks to Bonnie Webber.
- The Easter Sunrise service is being planned.
- Abbie Lampe is looking for volunteers for Connect 3.

Elders:

- Attendance averages: 113, Sunday Services; 15, WNL; 90, Ash Wednesday.
- The name tag program has been going well.
- Preparations are being made for Holy Week.
- Visitation plans are underway for distribution of Easter lilies.

Current Business:

- A St. John's 150th anniversary committee has been formed to brainstorm ideas for our celebration.
- Building Use Procedures: Draft policies have been written to be discussed by Council. Deb underlined their importance as a tool for future use.

In February the Elders and Staff met to review the 2025 Christmas Eve Service schedule. After a dedicated evaluation of past, present, and future needs of our St John's congregation, and with inclusion of ideas from some of our members, the following schedule was prayerfully agreed upon:

LENT, HOLY WEEK, AND EASTER SUNDAY 2025 AT ST. JOHN'S ~ "FROM ASHES TO RESURRECTION"







"Let us ever walk with Jesus, follow his example pure..." This text, from the first stanza of the hymn *Let Us Ever Walk with Jesus*, will be sung every Sunday throughout the season of Lent, as we journey *From Ashes to Resurrection*. We begin our walk on Ash Wednesday with the Imposition of Ashes and Holy Communion, and then continue to follow Jesus' example pure throughout the season of Lent. Our journey continues through Holy Week, as we remember Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. Handwashing, Holy Communion, and the telling of the Passion story continue our journey through Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. After the pain of Friday comes the joy of Sunday, as we remember Christ's resurrection with outdoor and indoor worship on Easter Sunday.

GOOD NEWS

The eastern monarch butterfly population nearly doubled in 2025, according to a new report published in Mexico, where the monarchs overwinter. The population wintering in central Mexico occupied 4.42 acres, up from 2.22 acres the previous winter. While monarchs occupied nearly twice as much habitat as



last year, populations remain far below the long-term average. The desired level for the population is 6 hectares (about 14.8 acres), so we need to keep up the good work! Spring Cleanup—WAIT!

When the weather warms up, we get spring fever and want to get out and clean out our flower gardens. Don't. Think twice before you rake, mow, and blow this year.

Invertebrates rely on fallen leaves and other organic debris to insulate them from the elements. Whatever your landscape, you can ensure that resources for nests and overwintering are available. Eighty percent of the bee population is killed by early cleanup. The consensus is that gardeners should wait until temperatures are 50 degrees or above for at least seven consecutive days. This is typically **mid to late April or May** in our area. Moderation is the best practice. At St. John's we will clean up the Labyrinth Garden and rose garden before then for appearance. We will let the rest of the gardens go until early May to protect the pollinators. For more information, go to **xerces.org/leave-the-leaves**.
