Ten Years Ago: we had our third annual Mini Golf Outing at Freddy Hill Fun Center. All ages welcome!

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
Five Years Ago: We celebrated 40 years of Rev. Dr. Sue's devoted service to St. John's.


One Year Ago: Our Library featured titles reflective of summer: Father's Day, Juneteenth, and Pride Month.

WHAT'S UP IN COUNCIL?



Financial Report, Susan Donahue:

Overall net income is doing well—about \$2,800 off budget. We are delaying transfers of the full amount normally done for the quarter and doing it monthly due to the insecurity of the stock market at this time. Grace Bruen added that the congregational giving is above budget.

Staff Reports:

Ministerial Staff (Rev. Dr. Linda Noonan, Rev. Tom Adil, Andrew Paulson, Abbie Lampe):

Pastor Linda stated her gratitude for support for her trip to Palestine and will be doing a presentation of her trip as soon as she finds an open date after the worship service.

She has updated the bulletin with a new font for those with visual difficulties and put in new information to make our building more accessible to newcomers. Linda is working on a community covenant document. She has had listening sessions with some of our congregants. Sunday, May 18, she will be doing a listening session for youth and young adults.

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More listening sessions are on the horizon for young families with children, and for LBGTQ folks, for worship and general information.

Pastor Tom has been assisting with the listening sessions and has been doing visitations. Listening to the newcomers has been helpful because of their perspectives in incorporating their ideas into our new vision for St. John's.

Andrew spoke about the very professional recording of the Brahms Requiem performance, using multiple camera angles and superior audio recording. He hopes everyone gets a chance to see and hear it.

Our choir will be at Trinity Lutheran for an 8:30 service Sunday, May 18, then back to St. John's for the 10:15 service.

Abbie Lampe spoke about the fun the kids had decorating the sidewalks with chalk during Easter week. The Children's Choir has concluded for the season.

Kay Peebles stated that, after hearing concerns that some people were not receiving emails or updates, she and Grace M. came up with a solution whereby people can opt back in.

Grace Marchione talked about the new banner in front of the church that can be used in a variety of ways, not just for announcements of events but inspiring messages for the community as well.

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She started an Instagram account and is looking to expand our video abilities. Grace will be reaching out to folks to do some informal video shoots about church activities.

Board Reports:

Trustees: (Alan Malachowski)

Kudos to Tim Leslie for his work as an interim custodian. He will be leaving at the end of May so if there is a college student in need of summer work, please have him/her contact Alan Malachowski. Talks are continuing about a new Facilities Manager. The front steps repairs have resulted in 2 estimates, both over \$100,000. A congregational vote will be required for this sum. Hopefully, work will begin by early June and be completed by September 1. A short congregational meeting for the vote will be held Sunday, June 1.

Deacons: (Judy Leslie)

Baskets for the raffle are on display in the Fireside Room. Tickets will be available after church services for the next few Sundays, at Lansdale Day, and at the church picnic. Volunteers are needed to help sell tickets on Lansdale Day. Judy Johnston will have a signup sheet on Sunday.

Educators: (Mary Billy)

We are working with Pastor Tom to find mentors for the confirmands, and with Abbie on Connect 3.

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They will be at the picnic providing games for kids and adults and are continuing with game night at 6:30 on Wednesdays through the summer. Confirmation is June 8; The Educators are the social hosts.

Elders: (Chriss Bodde)

There are mentors for each new member at St. John's.

WNL attendance average was 22; the 10:15 service average was 157; Easter Sunrise Service was 150, and the 10:15 service was 175.

New Business:

It was noted that the four Boards of Council are largely focused on the internal function of St Johns, and there is a need to formalize and organize a more "outward-facing" facet of the church. With this in mind, there was discussion about the creation of an outreach team to be of service to the most vulnerable in our community.

Remembering Juneteenth

"We're not free until we're all free.... We've got so many things that we need to attend to, and I contend that we can do it so much better if we're all on the same page." – Ms. Opal Lee, The Grandmother of Juneteenth

"What we're trying to get people to understand is that Juneteenth is freedom. And I don't mean just for Black people, or Texas people. It's freedom for everybody. Make a career of humanity. Commit yourself to the noble struggle for equal rights."

The Emancipation Proclamation, issued by President Lincoln on January 1, 1863, was meant to establish that all enslaved people in the Confederate States "are, and henceforward shall be free." However, we do not celebrate the freedom of slaves until five months and 18 days later

Juneteenth is now a federal holiday. It takes place on the 19th of June and celebrates the end of slavery in the United States. The holiday has been celebrated in Texas since 1980 and spread throughout the country until it was made a federal holiday in 2021—only four years ago—due to the hard work of activist Opal Lee, the "Grandmother of Juneteenth."

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In September 2016, at age 89, she walked from Fort Worth, Texas, to Washington DC to raise awareness about Juneteenth. "I started walking... I just knew that somebody would notice a little old lady in tennis shoes, and they did," she told the *Star-Telegram*. Ms. Opal states plainly that she did not walk the full 1,400 miles, "but I did walk some hundreds of miles" she told *Texas Monthly*, mentioning that at different stops on her journey—like Shreveport, Louisiana; Little Rock, Arkansas; St. Louis, Missouri; Chicago, Illinois; and Atlanta, Georgia—"everybody was so nice." When she finally arrived in DC in January 2017, the petition she presented to the US Congress had 1.5 million signatures calling for Juneteenth to be made a national holiday.

Ms. Opal started her walking campaign again in 2019, making it through seven states before COVID forced her to stop. However, when President Joe Biden signed the legislation making Juneteenth a national holiday on June 17, 2021, one year after the murder of George Floyd, Ms. Opal Lee was at his side.

So, why June 19th? The date marks the day, 901 days after the Emancipation Proclamation was signed, when troops arrived in Galveston, Texas, in 1865 to take control of the state and make sure all slaves would be freed. Even though General Robert E. Lee surrendered two months earlier in Virginia, slavery was not truly affected in Texas. It took US Major General Gordon Granger, standing on Texas soil, to read General Order No. 3: "The people of Texas are informed that, in accordance with the National Archives, all slaves are free."

It makes a good story, but the reality of racism is much darker. The Emancipation Proclamation only applied to places under Confederate control, not to slave-holding border states or rebel areas already under Union control. Most enslaved people got out themselves, fleeing behind Union lines as the Civil War moved south. In reality, the government had to rely on brute shows of force and simply hope that slave owners would see reason. They did not march into every plantation and ensure all the slaves were freed. To that end, historian and genealogist Antoinette Harrell discovered cases of African Americans still living as slaves 100 years after the Emancipation Proclamation, well into the 1960s.

"I couldn't believe what I was hearing. Most shocking of all was their fear. I saw time and time again; people were afraid to share their stories. They were afraid to give this information to me, even behind closed doors decades later. They believed that they might somehow get sent back to a plantation that wasn't even operating anymore. As I would realize, people are afraid to share their stories, because so many of the same families who owned these plantations are still running local government and big businesses. They still hold the power. So the poor and disenfranchised really don't have anywhere to share these injustices without fearing major repercussions. To most folks, it just isn't worth the risk. So, sadly, most situations of this sort go unreported." – Ms. Antoinette Harrell

What I take away from this is that Juneteenth is not just a celebration of the end of slavery, it is a reminder that change, even good change, comes not from written law but from kind and firm people on the ground doing what is right. Freedom comes from our community stepping up and showing up for one another. Freedom comes from a rejection of dehumanization; because if you allow yourself to believe that someone is anything but a living, breathing being, you can justify anything.

This is something reflected in our current world so aptly. Many Americans can sleep soundly at night because things are not happening to "us." However, we are all God's children. As siblings in Christ, it is our duty to stand with those who need our help, to lift up the voices of those who need to be heard. We are ALL made in God's image, from natural-born citizens to undocumented immigrants, retail workers to CEOs, Ukrainians to Palestinians, newborns to death-row inmates. As long as we remind ourselves of this simple fact, all is not lost.
