What an honor to witness the handiwork and good works happening at St. John's! In September, we begin our 8:00 am worship service. Over the course of the month, we'll we will be blessing everything from water (Sept. 7), to backpacks, students, and educators (Sept. 14), to canines, cats, and creepy-crawlies! (Blessings of the Animals at 2 pm on Sept. 28). On Tuesday, Sept. 9, we're flinging open the doors to share the music and message of Bobby Jo Valentine with the community on Sept. 9 as a prelude to our 10th Anniversary of being an Open and Affirming community.

We have created a corner of the sanctuary for our "soft worship space" where both kids and adults can engage their bodies in ways that allow them to be more present in worship. Our Boards and committees and volunteers and staff are doing what they do best, and are doing it well.

On Sunday, September 21 at 3:00 pm, we will be holding an "installation." An installation takes place after a church has called a settled pastor. After five months, I am starting to feel a little more "settled" and our North Penn Association and the Penn Southeast Conference of the UCC have said it is time for me to be installed at St. John's.

Even though all ministry is temporary and transitional (as Pastor Tom is now, sadly, reminding us), an installation is a way of marking a moment in which a congregation and pastor have chosen one another for their next chapter of ministry together. It is a way of affirming the movement of the Spirit that has called a particular leader and a congregation to be the best version of themselves possible for this time, in this place, trusting God's grace along the way.

I'm thrilled that someone who is a close friend, holy troublemaker, fierce prophet, and national faith leader, Bishop Dwayne Royster, will be the preacher on this day. Bishop Royster is an ordained UCC minister and the Executive Director of Faith in Action. A native Philadelphian with family in the area, he knows St. John's well and is eager to be with us. We will also receive greetings from a number of community and faith partners.

The installation is an opportunity for us to celebrate the rich history and the pastoral lineage of St. John's UCC as we stand on the cusp of our 150th anniversary. We are rooted and rising in love! It is an invitation to let our gifts shine, call our friends and colleagues to celebrate and encourage us, and give thanks for God's continued faithfulness on this journey.

Dear Friends at St. John's,

When I was afforded the honor of joining you 16 months ago, my simple intent was to travel alongside you as a pastor and servant-leader for whatever season God had in mind. My heart is still very much devoted to the people and the ministry of St. John's. I could not ask for better partners than in Pastor Linda and Andrew, and I have found much joy in the work of visiting the sick, deepening our faith and experiencing rich worship together. The whole St. John's team is an amazing, not-so-motley group! I foresee that the leadership of St. John's and the faith of its many members will allow this church to serve God in exciting new ways—ways that only the Spirit will reveal...and soon, I believe.

Throughout the many unexpected changes at St. John's over the past year, it has been clear to me that God has been in the midst of these changing times ("Behold, I make all things anew" – Isaiah 43:19). Despite the fact that change is almost always never easy, you have managed so much well and with God's grace. My ongoing prayer will be for you to recall the verse in scripture that goes something like this: "I can do all things through Christ Jesus who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13) as you face the ongoing challenges to come.

At St. John's, this past year has shown me that you are strong in heart and in the Spirit. Remember now, and always, that you are truly strongest when you are living not just for your own purposes, but living to enrich and support one another, to build a greater community, and lead lives that draw others to Christ and reflect the glory of God.


Summary of Council Minutes from Monday, June 9, 2025



Financial Report, Susan Donahue:

Although year-to-date net income is less than budgeted, overall net expenses are in line with projections. [continued at right]

Income higher than budgeted from tithes and offerings earlier in the year helped the overall impact of the recent decline in giving.

Staff Reports:

Andrew Paulson: Gathered in God's Name, Community Choir Hymn Festival was held here, Sunday, July 6. This is the third year cohosting music camp with Trinity.

Abbie Lampe: Connect 3 will continue through the summer. Planning fun outings as well.

Rev. Linda Noonan: I met with the youth group. They expressed that they like the way they feel at church, and they want to share their gifts with the church and serve.

We have been on a listening and discernment journey to better hear from everyone at church, so when decisions are made it will be the best representation of everyone at St. John's UCC. We will explore an external listening process once we have our own house in order—listening to our neighbors, our partners, our community. *[continued on next page]*

Rev. Tom Adil: Planning a staff retreat for the coming year. Listening sessions will be inspiring.

Kay Peebles, Office Manager: Going forward with the 2026 St. John's UCC Calendar, which will be free to the congregation.

Grace Marchione, Communications
Coordinator: Tech ambassadors (different
from tech committee) are working together
concerning accessibility. The tech
ambassadors are in the very beginning
stages of visioning conversations to make
St. John's comfortable and accessible to
everyone from all walks of life and all
backgrounds.

Board Reports:

Trustees, Steve Hendricks and Bob Bertolette: Cost for repair of the church steps will be close to \$200,000. We are meeting with roofers to repair a leak Working on restoring the spotlights in the sanctuary. Looking for people to be part of the group that opens and closes the church.

Deacons: Judy Leslie: Church picnic was a great time, with about 85 in attendance. We raised about \$600 on Saturday; total earnings, \$1,600.

Educators: Mary Billy: VBS, "Building on the Rock" will be a one-day family program on August 23 at 9 AM.

Elders, Bill Cagney: The pastors have requested we set up a soft worship space/children's cozy corner. New members dinner was a great success.

Current Business:

Sally Jarinko: Pennsylvania comprises four UCC conferences: Pennsylvania Southeast, Penn Northeast, Penn Central, and Penn West. In November 2024 the four conferences voted overwhelmingly to combine into the Keystone Conference.

Bill Leslie: Planning discussions begin concerning a new full-time facilities manager. [continued at right]



Summary of Council Minutes from Monday, July 28, 2025

VP Stepping Down

As per the bylaws, as VP Alan will be an *ex officio* member of all the boards.

Dan does not give consent to be president and does not believe he would be a good fit to keep up with the pace at St. John's very positive but very rapid pace. He feels he will be lagging behind.

Deb asked for a motion to accept Dan's resignation and Alan Malachowski's acceptance of VP role starting September 1. Motion was passed and seconded. Alan thanked Dan for his faith and confidence in him to take the role.

Facilities Manager Position

Anthony Ottaviano has been hired as fulltime Facilities Manager, with an August 15th start date. Foulkeways gave him a wonderful refence. We are hoping to have him as a primary point of contact for Montessori.

Financial Report, Susan Donahue: Income vs. Budget:

Income during June and July was \$135,789, including \$11,690 representing one month of the second quarter budgeted transfer. Of the income, \$48,877 came from tithes and offerings and \$65,252 was received from insurance toward the step repair. [continued on next page]

Expenses:

Total year-to-date operating expenses are, without the step repair, \$371,479, which is just below budget.

OCWM:

Donations to Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM) year-to-date total of \$29,910 is higher by \$2,716 than our year-to-date goal.

There is an opportunity for people to add blessings to the time capsule that will be put under the front steps during repair.

Rev. Tom: Tom made the bittersweet announcement of his plan to retire from his role as support minister at St Johns at the end of 2025.

Andrew Paulson, Minister of Music:

Tuesday, September 9, there is a free Bobby Jo Valentine (folk singer/songwriter) concert open to the community to kick off our 10-year anniversary as an open and affirming church.

Abbie Lampe, Connect3 Director: We had fun this summer doing a VBS program called True North.

St. John's United Church of Christ Congregational Meeting Sunday, June 1, 2025



Attendees:

Deb Dayton, Council President Dan Panachyda, Council Vice-President

Deb Dayton called the meeting to order at 10:37 AM and opened with prayer. Deb introduced Alan Malachowski, Chair of Trustees.

Alan stated the front steps of St. John's were destroyed on March 15, 2025. All parties involved in the accident were released from the hospital within a day.

St. John's has been working with their insurance company to secure three (3) bids. Additional information for restoration of the railing and landscaping and adjustments to center doors is included. Two (2) engineering studies have been completed and repair protocol developed with architectural drawings. The Trustees are ready to award the project to a local masonry firm. The front steps should be completed by Labor Day.

St. John's has been informed they may need to pay the \$25,000 deductible. St. John's insurance company will enter in a subrogation process with the driver's insurance company. There is no guarantee St. John's will recoup the \$25,000 deductible. An insurance attorney has been consulted. Grant money may be available for historic preservation.

The congregation is required by the Constitution and By-Laws to approve this expenditure since it was not part of the budget process. Trustees are requesting release of the funds for payment of deductible, if it becomes necessary.

Deb Dayton presented the recommendation by Grace Bruen, Finance Chair, for congregational approval for release of funds from the Unrestricted Investments Account.

Motion:

Liz Vanderburg moved to approve the recommendation by the Finance Committee and the Trustees for release of \$25,000 from the Unrestricted Investments Account. Andy Faga seconded the motion.

Question:

Would any insurance money received be returned to the Unrestricted Investments account?

Alan M: Insurance companies will determine what the amount will be. If funds are recouped through the subrogation process, then funds will go back to the unrestricted fund.

Question:

How did Trustees determine which bidder to use out of the three (3) bids received?

Alan M: The steps are made from limestone, which requires a qualified mason. The Trustees are recommending the local company from Telford. The three bids were from:

- 1) Disciple Masonry, who has been repointing the church building.
- 2) A recommendation by the insurance adjustor of a company located in Telford with knowledge of historical work.
- 3) A company with little knowledge of working with limestone.

Question:

What is the total cost of the job? Alan M: The cost is changing due to initial estimates not including additional work being identified. Proposals are being revised. The masonry work alone is approximately \$130,000. The railing, landscaping, and doors need repair. Worst case scenario is \$25,000 for St. John's. Question:

Are there extenuating circumstances the driver's insurance may not cover?

Alan M: Coverage for the driver is unknown. PA law requires property damage of \$15,000. Question:

Has fundraising from St. John's and the community for expenses/landscaping been considered?

Alan M: Total cost for repairs is unknown. Grant funds are being pursued through local state representative Steve Malagari.

The congregational vote passed 86 YES, 0 NO. The meeting was adjourned at 10:57 a.m.



As we approach St. John's 150th anniversary in 2026, we are digging deep into the church archives to connect with the stories that shaped us. Leaning on his extensive knowledge and storytelling ability, we are excited to share these artifacts and anecdotes as a way to honor the past and imagine what the next 150 years could bring.

Stories from St. John's Celebration Sunday!

On September 7th we will observe "Celebration Sunday." This is traditionally the day we return to our full calendar of activities after summer break and vacations. Did you know this tradition goes back over 100 years at St. John's?



At St. John's and most churches, starting in the 1920s, this was known as "Rally Day," a Sunday to come together after summer and build excitement for the Sunday School's upcoming year. A standout Rally Day was in September 1923 (see Reporter article on our website for full page), when 2,110 people from every church Sunday School in the borough marched together in a Rally Day parade in downtown Lansdale on a Saturday afternoon, described by The Reporter as Lansdale's "Greatest Religious Event." The parade marched to Memorial Park where there was singing (led by St. John's choir leader, M. Ellen Geller) and speeches. The next day each church held its own Rally Day, and The Reporter headline read "Reformed Show Largest Attendance," with 470 persons attending at St. John's!

Rally Day continued at St. John's for another 60+ years. One of the long-held traditions, before we became aware as "creation stewards," was a colorful "balloon release" on the front lawn following worship. The balloons had tags attached and many were returned from all over the area. When we became aware of the environmental consequences to animals and waterways after the balloons landed, this tradition purposely ended.

Looking for a new identification, in 1987 the name of the event was changed to "Celebration Sunday." (See photos on next page.) The Sunday School students were joined by congregants arriving for worship in the front courtyard. The Associate Pastor led the ceremony and the Children's Choir director would lead the crowd in singing. In 2013, the gathering moved to the new back courtyard, with crowds filling the courtyard, the ramp, and into the parking lot! Each person received a token gift reminding us of our new theme for the year.

As with many traditions, the pandemic brought changes to Celebration Sunday. In 2020, a "spread-out" event took place in our various parking lots. Since there was no return to classes or activities, Celebration Sunday was not 'celebrated' for a few years. Now we are rebuilding a full schedule of worship and activities for 2025 and beyond, with new hopes and new leadership. Come and be part of St. John's history on September 7th at 10:15 AM!



St. John's Youth Group at Freddy Hill by Kay Peebles

At approximately 5:30 pm on Wednesday June 18, I get home from work. Mike, a 16-year-old I refer to as "The Teenager" in my phone, my anecdotes, and to my colleagues and friends and family, but who internally I refer to as "little brother," is lying on his bed with an arm behind his head and his phone in his hand. This, I've surmised, is one of The Teenager's four main states of being (at the gym with headphones, on the couch with Xbox controller, on a bike with friends, and in bed with phone). I announce that today, he said he would go mini golfing with the new youth group at my job. This, of course, is news to The Teenager (if you have one, you likely must remind them several times of things). This is because the average Teenager must juggle a million details that are only vaguely related to one another and it is easy to drop one or two with 999,998 more in the air, and prioritizing comes only with experience.

I sidestep his confusion and hesitation with more enticing details—free mini golf, fun with other teens, and free ice cream—and rush to get changed from work clothes to mini golf–appropriate clothes. When I return, The Teenager is standing, now in a black T-shirt that happens to match mine, his phone in his hand, and a peculiar look on his face. I recognize this look, these nerves, and try to get ahead of them with a timeworn babysitting solution: immediate and efficient distraction.

"You can bring anyone you want, as many as you want," I say. "How about..." I list off some teens I have driven to Wawa or Wendy's, teens whose smiles, yelling, and laughter I recognize from the pickup line at North Penn High School, the parking lots of apartment complexes, the sidewalks and back roads of Lansdale. Then I offer a trump card – a friend whose parents I am sure will say yes to a church event.

Did I mention I will drive them? I'll go get those friends and we'll go to Freddy Hill together, and then I'll drive him home. Mention that Freddy Hill Farms is closing and if we don't go now, who knows if we ever can again. Mention that it's right now. Right, right now. That we will be on our way the second his parents say yes and there in under ten minutes. Make sure he asks his parents. What did they say? See? I told you so. Come on, let's go, let's go.

I have one eye on the clock. It is 6:45 and the meet-up is at 7 pm. The Teenager, his friend, and I get to Freddy Hill Farms almost fifteen minutes late. I tell them to run because Teenagers like running, but also because it helps my nerves. I am still, for now, the Cool Older Sibling. This is a title that took an entire year and a half of investment and kept promises and overzealous support and listening without judging and trying as hard as I can to understand why things are cool. I want to remain the Cool Older Sibling for my entire life and maybe have it put on my headstone or have some sort of plaque about it. Despite proof otherwise, I am certain that a single bad experience will rip my title from me like a Band-Aid. I want The Teenager and his friend to have fun. I want them to relax and be safe and make a million friends. I know I cannot force any of these things and instead just try to have fun and extend the fun I'm having to them.

The clouds are rolling and it's hot and humid. My T-shirt sticks to my back, and I am not any good at mini golf. Luckily, no one is the Tiger Woods of Mini Golf. Mini Golf, I explain to The Teenager and his friend, is possibly one of the hardest sports ever known to humankind, but it's a little silly, so that makes up for it. We don't even keep score. It's just fun.

We move through hilariously complex courses and lose balls to water, bushes, tall grass, and more water, we laugh at our failures and at each other. We watch the other teens ahead of us and the unrelated family behind us. We cheer for others and cheat just a little when we think Rev. Linda isn't looking. There are more smiles and laughter than I've seen in The Teenager for the last three months.

After we fail to get a free game at the last hole of the course, we trudge in a parade of teenagers and St. John's adults from the mini golf course to the ice cream shop. We prioritize cooling off with water as we wait in line and try to figure out the best combination of flavors, weigh the pros and cons of gummy bears vs Reece's Pieces. We talk about whether it's sprinkles or jimmies, how much chocolate is too much chocolate, waffle cone vs sugar cone.

We sit at a table with the others, and I proudly introduce The Teenager as "my little brother, Mike," to the President of Council, to Abbie and everyone, and it is not brought up that he looks nothing like me. I have never introduced him as my little brother before, but I am so so proud of him I have to. We take a group photo and we smile and wave and it feels like a wonderful beginning.

We have just left the parking lot when The Teenager turns to me and says *thank you*. "Thank you for making me do this. It was fun. So much fun. Thank you."

"Of course," I say, definitely not tearing up and absolutely holding the steering wheel like a normal, not emotional person. "I'm glad you came. Told you so." And then, as I put on the turn signal and focus on driving safely, I ask, tentatively "...so, you had fun?"

The rest of the ride is them telling me their favorite parts, about details I had seen and fretted over, about how hilarious it was losing golf balls and leaning over the water, and how good the ice cream was. How it was unbelievably hot, but the ice cream after was perfect.

For the first St. John's Youth Group Hangout, we provided a space that allowed The Teenager and his friend, fresh out of their first year of high school, to relax without thinking about drama and relationships—to just be teenagers. We were able to provide a fun break from everything going on in their busy and overwhelmingly eventful lives.

As he leaves the car, his friend makes me promise I'll invite him to the next one.
